1 TEXTURAL GROUND

Instead of defaulting to painted drywall, create a backdrop with depth. McQuaide adds texture and age by wrapping the space in paneling. The modest material references the home's circa-1900 history and seaside location while establishing a laid-back air. The lime plaster range hood is also authentic in a home of this provenance. You can achieve a similar suedelike look with limewash paint.

2 MATERIAL MIX

Avoid one-note schemes by choosing unexpected pairings that generate drama. To contrast the wood planks, McQuaide used sleek slabs of robust-vein marble as the room's showstopping focal point, making the kitchen fresh rather than fusty. (Quartz, porcelain, and laminate surfaces can be less-expensive alternatives.) Handmade ceramic pendants, left, with utilitarian chains accentuate the high-contrast effect.

3 IMPERFECT PATINA

Incorporating living finishes imbues this recently renovated kitchen with a sense of age that nods to its origins. "Mix in your older things for instant patina," the designer advises. The homeowner's dinged-up pine table, *left*, will continue to collect marks and scratches, as will the honed marble countertops. Unlacquered brass hardware darkens over time; the leather chairs will garner wear, too, taking on a handsome burnished quality. []

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Opt for pendants made from organic materials in simple shapes to lend modernity to an otherwise historical kitchen.
